



Latvia's rating drop in the 2019 Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI) is an indication of serious political corruption risks

Latvia received 56 points out of 100 in the latest CPI and is ranked 44th out of 180 countries. In 2018 Latvia garnered 58 points.

The CPI results show that efforts to reduce corruption have stagnated – over the past five years Latvia has gained only one point in the index. Data analyzed for the index show that the assessment of Latvia's fight against political corruption, including dealing with conflict of interest issues and special interests influencing the government, has declined.

Latvia's CPI results fell relative to the other Baltic nations. Lithuania (60 pts) and Estonia (74) both improved their assessments by one point.

Delna's impact in 2019

Delna gained 17 new members in 2019, advised and supported 44 potential whistleblowers, advocated anti-corruption innovations, and continued to safeguard public interest. Learn more about Delna's top 7 significant accomplishments here.

Delna director Liene Gātere participated in the State Chancellery discussions about ethical and integrity risks posed to government officials

Political and public officials together with experts met on January 17 to discuss the GRECO (Group of States Against Corruption) recommendations for Latvia on questions regarding integrity and ethical standards for political officials and issues related to improving mutual cooperation.

Delna supports the effective utilization of budget resources granted to the NGO Fund

Delna, along with other non-governmental organizations, sent a letter to the "Society Integration Fund" (SIF) Council and to the Prime Minister requesting that the NGO Fund's grant regulations include as a priority the development of civic dialogue. On January 16 the SIF Council announced a call for projects related to the NGO Fund

2020 program. The proposed program will support projects that aim, inter alia, to increase participation in the decision-making process.

Saeima begins work on developing "lobbying transparency" rules

One of Delna's priorities for 2020 is lending support to those decision makers developing all encompassing "lobbying transparency" regulations. On January 15 Delna lawyer Zane Zvirgzdiņa participated in the Saeima (parliament) work group developing these regulations.

Second conference on whistleblowing planned

Planning for a second Alliance against Corruption in Latvia conference on the Whistleblowing Law is underway. The law has been in effect for almost a year and it is time to review the first impressions from the state and private sectors as well as to discuss what businesses and public agencies have gained from their internal whistleblower systems. The practical portion of the conference will look at how whistleblowing reports are investigated, communication with whistleblowers, and how to promote internal whistleblowing.

The conference is planned for March 26 and is sponsored in part by the Kingdom of the Netherlands embassy in Latvia.
