

# An Expert Forum and Public Discussion on "How to Increase Trust in Public Institutions in Latvia"

A lack of trust in public institutions has made it difficult to implement government decisions and that can affect various social spheres, from national security to achieving economic growth to combatting the COVID-19 virus.

On September 10 Transparency International Latvia (Delna) held an international expert forum and public discussion on "How to Increase Trust in Public Institutions in Latvia" where issues such as the handling of the COVID-19 pandemic in Latvia and the pandemic's effect on the public's trust in state institutions and on democracy in Latvia were examined. Participants were asked to share their views on the progress that Latvia needs to achieve in order to realize good governance and promote people's trust in public institutions.

This was the third of four planned round table meetings that are based on recommendations from the Council of Europe's Group of States Against Corruption (GRECO) and on promoting transparency and progress in preventing corruption in Latvia.

## Regulations on Lobbying Transparency – A Step Toward Transparency and An Honest Political Environment

In order to improve the public's trust in the Parliament and the Government's decisions, discussions have been going on for almost 15 years on the need for more encompassing lobbying regulation.

Commenting on this Delna director Inese Tauriṇa pointed out that the public's trust in how government decisions are made is very low. Regulations on transparency in lobbying is a step in the right direction in developing an honest and transparent political environment.

# The Director of Delna: Lack of Trust in Government Makes It Difficult to Implement Decisions

A concerning picture appears after analyzing the level of trust of state institutions in Latvia – studies confirm that people's trust in the executive branch, the parliament, and political parties is among the lowest in the EU, and this lack of trust in government institutions has made it harder to carry out political decisions.

Delna director Inese Tauriņa points out that this lack of trust in government can make it harder to put public decisions into effect. We see this on a daily basis and it can affect various spheres – national security, economic policies, the fight against COVID-19, vaccination efforts, and others.

## **Taxes Should Serve Society**

# Jānis Ikstens: The Government is Holding the Reins to Fiscal Discipline too Tightly

While researching transparency related issues during the COVID-19 pandemic (in Latvian), Delna's discussions with social activists identified a problem – people don't know the criteria used in preparing the national budget.

Commenting on the 2022 state budget, political scientist Jānis Ikstens pointed out that Latvia's government is adhering to a policy of fiscal discipline while interest rates on borrowing are negative. Current economic conditions are such that Latvia can borrow money today and later pay back less than what they borrowed.

# Long Time Delna Supporter Pēteris Bolšaitis Has Passed Away

It is with great sadness that we announce the death of long-time Delna friend and supporter Pēteris Bolšaitis who passed away on September 11.

Pēteris Bolšaitis was born in 1937 in Daugavpils, Latvia. In 1944 Pēteris and his family fled the war in Latvia, becoming refugees in Austria. From there they emigrated to Venezuela. In 1964 he received his doctorate degree from the University of Delaware. Pēteris together with his wife established two scholarships in Latvia: one for members of the sorority *Varavīksne* and the other the "Lāčplēša" Center scholarship. He also set up the "Silent Hero" foundation that provides scholarships to talented young people and has supported the publication of numerous books.

Supporting Delna, Bolsaitis donated 980 euros in total.
